Without our volunteers and donors, Hawk Mountain Council would not be able to deliver the transformative, mountain-top experience of Scouting to the youth of our community. Our mission is to teach young people to make ethical and moral choices over their lifetimes by instilling in them the values of the Scout Oath and Law. With your help, we have been able to deliver upon that mission in considerable ways. We are pleased to highlight some of the Council's achievements in 2023.

- Over 80,000 pounds of food collected for those in need through Scouting for Food
- Record-setting attendance of 56 youth at our locally hosted, week-long National Youth Leadership Training (NYLT)
- 1,748 individual rank advancements earned and presented to our youth.
- 91 Scouts earned the Rank of Eagle demonstrating their leadership skills and their dedication to service.
- 4,196 merit badges earned by Scouts taking an interest in and learning about skills, vocations, and avocations.
- Continued progress to create a conservation easement for Hawk Mountain Scout Reservation. The easement will help preserve the land surrounding the camp for future generations of Scouts, and to obtain funds for continued maintenance of the camp.
- Welcomed more than 649 new families who joined our great program this year.




FUNDING SCOUTING

CAMPING & OUTDOOR PROGRAMS

- Over 1,475 Scouts, Leaders, and Staff participated in Scouts BSA, Cub Scout Day Camp, Cub Scout Resident Camp, and Webelos Resident Camp. This means over 5,800 nights of camping were done by youth in 2023.
- The Hawk Mountain Council NYLT Course staff delivered a great leadership program for 55 youth in 2023.
- HMSR offered merit badge days in the spring and fall with 185 youth participating. 24 different merit badges were available to our Scouts BSA members. Our Scouts earned over 200 badges during these days.
- 151 of our Cub Scouts and their families participated in the Cub Scout Summer Games, Holiday Haus, and Cub Scout STEM University in 2023.

Membership

- 13.8% of all Hawk Mountain Council Scouts are Female and we now have 14 active Girl Troops.
- 87 youth from the City of Reading were able to benefit by participating in 4 STEM Labs in the 2023–2024 school year.
- 59 elementary-aged youth from the YMCA in Pottsville and Reading participated in summer and afterschool Cub Scout programs.
- The Council partnered with the Olivet Boys and Girls
 Club in Reading, offering Cub Scouts to 222 youth at 4
 locations throughout the city.
- The Council continues its long-standing relationship with the John Paul II Center by offering free Cub Scout programming to 53 students.
